The meeting convened at 10:00 a.m.

Announcements:

Old Business:

- The minutes from September 14, 2022 were reviewed. Attendees on Zoom at the meeting were corrected. Kathy Koch, Francine Stayer, Ellen Alex. Minutes approved as corrected.
- **We Grow** Quick Talk About Your 2022 Gardening Experiences: David asked for a positive and a negative outcome/experience from this year's season.

Positives:

Kelley Rourke – First time growing VVGT herbs and vegetables – all well done, her first experience with Epazote.

Kim L'Heureux – Poppies were gorgeous.

Kath Koch - High yield of tomatoes.

Mary Ellen Calta – VVGT beans to dry were slow, but prolific.

Ellen Alex – Learned about a stinky cocktail which she made to deer deterrent – mums were excellent.

Francine Stayter – Used a 5-gallon bucket every day to throw the weeds in it. Helps keep weeding to a minimum and easy cleanup.

Chris Burrington – Grew sweet potatoes for the first time; fun to do and will do again.

Susanna Membrino – Grew celery for the first time – very tough – Carol Phelps suggested that it should be picked earlier.

Kathy McGuire – Bounty of zucchini and tomatoes.

Carol Phelps – First time growing profusion zinnias, excellent, will grow again, also basket flower, dahlias and tiger asters were wonderful.

Mary Ellen Crawford – Grew annuals in pots very successful, Mandevilla thrived.

Darleen Fournier - Very successful learning to start seeds.

Dianne Dirig – Expanded raspberry bed was abundant provider of berries and blackberry lily excellent.

Negatives:

Dianne Dirig - Butternut squash, only two; plant was eaten up early.

Kelley Rourke – No apples this year.

Ellen Alex – Lost all container plants due to drought and inability to keep them watered.

Kathy Koch – Birds attack and eating tomatoes for the fun of it and lost squash plants.

Mary Ellen Calta – Zucchini plant lost early due to drought.

Kim L'Heureux – 4-legged fast bug ate all her scented leaved plants and the red Asian beetle took over.

Francine Stayter – Apple Yellow tomato, AAS winner, grew to 8-feet tall and very wide – will not grow again.

Chris Burrington – Eggplant not good; giving up on trying.

Susanna Membrino – mice ate carrots and tomatoes.

Carol Phelps – problem with squash borers.

Darleen Fournier – Seeds started; could not water; all gone.

Kathy McGuire – lost peonies due to a lightning strike that went underground and must have burned the plants.

Mary Ellen Crawford – Will not grow petunias in pots – drought and could not keep them watered. They got leggy.

Committee Reports:

Education & Outreach: Francine's 10/11 report is attached.

Seed Saving workshop was held on September 22, from 5:30 – 7 p.m.
 Registrants appreciated the early evening timing. Darlene shared bags for seed saving. Francine found some in the Dollar Store.

- We will offer a Winter Sowing Workshop at the Oneonta Job Corps. Date TBD.
- The Pickin' Patch Emporium (Rt. 7 in Maryland) has offered space to MGVs and can hold 12-15 people.
- There was a Facebook post re: interest in a Cooperstown Community Garden. A local survey to residents will be compiled for interest in a community garden. If yes, MGVs can offer to establish, but not maintain; site will be offsite from CCE.
- December meeting could be a social event to celebrate the year. Location TBD.
 MG survey sent to see if 4:30 6:30 p.m. timing would allow for daytime workers.
- **Question to MGs:** Do you have a community garden in your community? Let Francine know; may be grant funding available. Milford is starting one.
- Nader Towers Keyhole Garden in the planning stage for low income, handicapped clients. Gardens in Albany are prefabricated metal ones (costly). Home Depot donated some; more information is needed.
- Cooperstown Graduate program surveyed community gardens and the report is on our website Dianne Dirig suggested this has community gardens in it. Check Moodle page. (David to look into further.)
- 808 people see our Facebook page with 19% response rate.

Finance: Mary Ellen Crawford's report will be sent to all next month.

Plant Sale: Carol Phelps reported that \$1,780.39 was spent on supplies; \$1,036.92 for capital expenses (lights/shelving). Total expenses, \$2,817.32. Budgeted \$500 for plugs.

Seed Starting: Kim and Carol met; need to know what to grow. Meeting tomorrow, 10/13, at the Rowe House, 4:30 p.m. AAS plugs ordered – salvia and petunias.

GROW w/CCE and Grounds – Pati reported that Phase One is in progress and the infrastructure for water and electric is complete; surface of parking lot is finished. Kevin Greene and Bert Holmes (Epic) will work next on the slab for the garden house. The holding beds behind the house will be taken out to allow 12' for a lean-to structure for garbage receptacles and compost.

The fuel tank pipes to the furnace were damaged; currently no heat. The basement needs to be cleaned out to allow for a fuel tank to be installed. Clean-up of basement will be Tuesday, October 18, 9 a.m., with the Grounds Committee meeting at 10 a.m.

VVGT needs to have plants and seeds ordered.

David suggested that the books in MG office could go to Worcester Library and he would deliver them.

Are hybrid (in-person/online) meetings ok? Suggested that to improve meetings, folks attending in person bring their personal laptops; hand raising should be used, and to have a help monitoring the chat box. Since there is difficulty, a survey is needed for Master Gardeners to comment.

New committee structures will be addressed at November meeting.

Upcoming Events: Seed Swap, Saturday, January 28 – where? Recommended places in Oneonta: Farmers' Market at Foothills, FoxCare Center, St. James Episcopal Church. If we use the church, Ellen Alex suggested to budget a donation for use of the church.

Kelley's Hardware in Cobleskill has donated two boxes of seeds; Susan Carver is sorting through them for both counties.

There are 43 participants in the new MGV Training; nine from Otsego County.

Please attend classes that interest you – they are via Zoom and the link (one link for the entire 20 weeks is available); Monday's class is on Soils.

Pati Grady invited everyone to the CCE Annual meeting (Tuesday, 10/25, 6:30 p.m.). An invite will be sent. Be sure to register so a link can be to you. Meeting will be via Zoom or in person in both Cobleskill and Oneonta.

Plant Sale and Seed Starting Committee Report November 2022

- 1. See Profit report for 2022 Plant Sale. Profit, even with full expense of light set-up, is \$6,694.14
- 2. Seed staring supplies have been ordered for 2023 season. Order was based on what we had on hand. Labels were not ordered, as price was 3 times last year.
- 3. Seeds have been ordered.
- 4. Kim has done much research on availability of plugs for our use. Bottom line: we would have to take leftovers and our choices would not necessarily be what we want. Plugs are produced so the timing to bring them to late May sell date require a greenhouse.
- 5. Two more Master Gardeners would like a light set-up. Without buying the plugs, we have money in the budget to purchase.
- 6. Seed Starting will start in January. First Plant Sale meeting will be in March. Proposed dates are as follows. These are not confirmed dates.
 - Tuesday, January 31: Seed starting; supply distribution and seeds needing stratification
 - Thursday, February 16; Seed starting
 - Wednesday ,March 1: First Plant Sale Meeting; Calendar and task list
 - Wednesday, March 8: Seed Starting in conjunction with MG monthly meeting
 - Monday, March 20: Plant Sale meeting followed by Seed Starting session
 - Tuesday, April 4: Plant Sale meeting followed by Seed Starting session
 - Monday, April 17: Seed Starting
 - Tuesday, April 25: Plant Sale, finalize prices
 - Wednesday, May 3: Seed Starting for final potting up
 - Wednesday, May 20: Plant Sale finalizing work assignments in conjunction with MG monthly meeting
 - Monday, May 15: Plant Sale Preliminary Set-up
 - Friday, May 19: Plant Sale Set-up
 - Saturday, May 20: Plant Sale
- 7. Plant Sale Meetings will be hybrid. Seed Starting will be at CCE in Cooperstown. Supplies will be distributed at the meetings. If seed starters cannot be at a meeting those attending the meeting will pack up a "To Go" pack for the member to pick up at his or her convenience.
- 8. Seed Starting is a professional development opportunity. All are welcome to join the meetings even if they cannot host plants in their home. Part of the professional development is learning by doing and learning from mistakes.

* Light Set-ups Expense Caveat:

Light set-ups are a capital expenditure and should be expensed over a useful life period. If we designate a five-year expense period, the cost attributable for the 2022 Plant Sale expenditures for light set-ups would be \$187.80. But we would also need to include an expense line for past capital expenditures for light set-ups. A five-year useful life per set-up might be good for tax reporting, but in reality too short. The shelving should last 20 years, and the lights themselves at least 5 years.

In short, we need to account for the cost of the light set-ups, but this report is overstating the expense per year for our investment in light set-ups.

- 7. Francine talked of the potential of the grant for adding keyhole raised beds for the elderly and disabled gardeners at Nader Towers. She will contact Kurt Shultes, head of Oneonta Housing Authority.
- 8. K. McGuire and Francine will get together in the next few days to prepare a Cooperstown Community Garden survey. David and Liz will help with distribution.

October	 Solicit seed donations from Kelley's Farm and Garden and Noble Ace Hardware. (Seed from Kelley's) If volume is small, consider requesting seeds from <u>High</u> <u>Mowing</u>. <u>donations@highmowingseeds.com</u> (N/A) 		
November – December	Sort seeds. Consider sharing w/neighbor program.Encourage all MGs to save and prepare seed to share.		
Early January	 Begin promotion of the swap with the creation of posters, social media images, and a press release. 		
Mid-January	 Inventory seed swap supplies (small envelopes and markers); purchase more if needed. Make about 20 copies (per county) of the annual Cornell Recommended Vegetable Varieties. Compile additional handouts (i.e. how to save seeds, starting seeds indoors) and CCE information. 		
Swap Day	 Times TBC: MGs arrive about an hour early to set up for the swap. A minimum of four table groupings are needed; veggie seeds, flower seeds, herb and miscellaneous seeds; and handouts. A fifth table grouping may be needed for donated plants/books. Reserve space on each table for extra seeds that participants may bring seeds to the swap. Designate one person for registration/head count. Welcome participants. Point out the MGs and mention that they are available to help. Depending on donated seed packet volume, participants can take a whole packet or part of a packet. At closing, gather seeds into boxes, label the boxes. 		
Early February	 At closing, gatter seeds into boxes, laber the boxes. Send a note to the Times Journal, noting the success of the event and thanking the sponsors (those who donated seed and the venue) Determine placement of left-over seeds, plants, books, etc.

- Raised beds & fencing on south side of parking lot removed; fencing stored, garden shed will be relocated
- Path from parking lot to CCE building has been reinforced; handicapped ramp reconfigured
- Lumber for raised beds moved from Mohican Farms; on site ready for use
- Specs on garden house slab determined (cement color & finish), expected to be poured 11/8
- Next step is to install TrueGrid (base surface for all garden areas except raised beds & garden house)
- Construct raised beds on site
- Dig in-ground beds
- Garden house windows have arrived at Bruce Hall's
- Fundraising update
 - 10/3/22 last donation received (\$25k Heilig Foundation \$25k will be forthcoming in Spring 2023)
 - \$129,042 cash received to date
 - \$22,260 in-kind donations
 - \$25k restricted funds (Laura Jane Musser Foundation)
 - \$351,302 total committed to project to date (includes \$150k from NY State still in limbo)
 - Still seeking other funding opportunities to be ready for Phase II next Spring
